

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"How do you help people come to faith in Christ in a culture deeply but imperfectly suffused with Christian themes? How do you nurture genuine faith when everyone thinks they know what Christianity is, but actual knowledge and commitment are lacking? How do you educate people about Christianity when broad but shallow exposure to the faith domesticates it and makes people miss out on its soul transforming power?"

The questions above were raised by Benjamin Crosby in an article published earlier this year in Plough Quarterly. They are questions that nearly every clergy person in America today wrestles with. In today's society where many wrongly assume their Google search carries as much if not more weight than a professional's years of intense and articulated theological study, it can be not just difficult but downright disheartening to attempt to guide a faith community. The secular and the spiritual have become disturbingly blurred in a way that threatens to drown the faithful in nostalgic Americana with a vaguely religious undertone. With one hour a week, where does the pastor focus a congregation's attention?



How can the church differentiate itself from every other civic organization of American society? How can we sift the wheat from the chaff? These questions are not new, for Martin Luther, Ulrich Zwingli, Desiderius Erasmus, and other 15th century Reformers made many of the same complaints.

The church is at its best when it lives most deeply into the ability of the faith to transform lives. When we recognize that we are called to worship God and follow in the work of Jesus the Christ; a man who ate with sinners, healed the sick, fed the hungry, welcomed and restored outcasts to community, condemned the greed of the rich and powerful, and called his followers to go and do likewise.

Some of you may have noticed that I haven't placed an emphasis on many of those "tried and true" secular holidays. This is intentional—because we have much work to do and in the words of Jesus, "the harvest is plentiful but the laborers are few" (Luke 10:2) and all those popular secular holidays get plenty of coverage by others in society. The church is called to (1) Give glory to God and (2) Be co-workers with God, as disciples of Jesus Christ, for the furtherance of God's reign on earth. Thus the holidays I emphasize are ones that help us to accomplish one or both of those goals. I write these words, having just completed the worship outline for our August 31 service which will lift up the theme of "Labor" on Labor Day weekend. The origins of this holiday came out of organized labor movements in England at the height of the Industrial Revolution as increased attention was being focused on the thousands of people from vulnerable populations who were dying every year from the poor working conditions and long hours they were forced to engage in for survival. Inspired by those movements, labor unions in the United States urged working class people to give up a day's pay to participate in a parade celebrating the contributions of hard working laborers. Within 12 years, the movement created such disruption in the US economic workforce system, that President Grover Cleveland created the federal Labor Day holiday in 1894. But today the goal of those earlier labor unions appears lost as more than 40% of businesses remain open on labor day, with the vast majority of those "on the clock" coming from the working-class.

Our denomination, along with a multitude of other faith traditions and denominations, celebrates Labor in the Pulpit Sunday, issues resolutions of witness regarding fair labor practices and pro-union efforts, participates in demonstrations and more, all as part of the commitment to economic justice. Celebrating Labor Day is a faithful witness to the call of God to care for the vulnerable and to ensure that all may be granted sabbath rest from their labors.

In the midst of our cookouts, travels, leisure or work, may we be reminded of our Christian calling to bring the good news of God's concern for all who labor, that they may find rest, and that all may receive what they need to survive and thrive in this world.

2 Timothy 2:6 "The hardworking farmer should be the first to receive a share of the crops."

Deuteronomy 24:14 "You shall not withhold the wages of poor and needy laborers, whether citizens or foreigners."

Exodus 23:6 "Don't undermine the justice that your poor deserve in their lawsuits."

Mark 6:31 "Many people were coming and going, so there was no time to eat. He said to the apostles, 'Come by yourselves to a secluded place and rest for a while."

Ecclesiastes 3:13 "Moreover, this is the gift of God: that all people should eat, drink, and enjoy the results of their hard work."

Proverbs 31:8 "Speak out on behalf of the voiceless, and for the rights of all who are vulnerable."

Philippians 2:4"Instead of each person watching out for their own good, watch out for what is better for others."



You are hereby invited to a special congregational meeting on **Sunday, September 21**, 2025, at 10:30am, immediately following our regular worship service. The purpose of this meeting is to vote on a proposal to approve a major capital expenditure.


Our Property Committee has been working to address the necessary rebuilding of the church's chimney. After careful review and consideration, the committee has recommended that the congregation accept the bid from Holton Brothers for this project, at a cost of \$15,970. This proposal has been approved by the Church Council.

According to our bylaws, any expenditure exceeding \$7,500 requires approval from the full congregation before we can move forward. Your participation in this decision is vital to the stewardship of our church's resources. Money from the Endowment Council Designated Fund for Projects will be used to initially pay for this project.

We encourage all members to attend this important meeting to discuss the proposal and cast your vote. This is an opportunity for us to come together as a body to ensure the continued safety and functionality of our church building.

"This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it ..." Exodus 12:14


The biblical calendar had many feasts and festivals. They were connected with the changing of the seasons or special events. Below are some of the special days observed by the Israelites.
